New Testament letters : questions to get you thinking

Part A - the overview: catching the big idea

Read the letter aloud straight through without stopping.

Keep reading it again until you can answer these questions.

- 1. Who is writing the letter and who is it written to?
- 2. Who are these people and what do you know about them?
- 3. Where are these people living and why are they there?
- 4. What do you know about these places? What was life like?
- 5. Having found the writer and recipient, now find the other parts of the letter. (greeting, prayer wish, main body, final greeting & farewell)
- 6. Consider the historical context. How does the letter fit with the book of Acts? Which cultural, social or religious customs at that time relate to this letter?
- 7. What are the writer's main concerns? Why was the letter written?
- 8. Write down any words or phrases that keep cropping up.
- 9. Make a list of the main themes.
- 10. What do you think is the single major theme of the letter?
- 11. Make a note of anything you do not understand.

Part B - the detail: getting to grips with each thought

Read the chapter or passage many times in different translations.

- 1. What do you think are the important words and what do they mean?
- 2. Break the chapter or passage into sections of thought.

For each section

- What issue is being dealt with? What part does 1st century culture play?
- Is there anything else in the Bible which helps you understand the issue?
- Write down in your own words any principles the writer applied to the issue.
- How was the 1st century reader expected to respond?
- Are we expected to respond in the same way today? Why?
- Write a brief summary of the section in your own words.
- 3. Are you facing a similar issue or situation in your life at the moment?
- 4. How do any of the principles in the letter apply to your situation today?
- 5. What could you do now?
